PRESIDENTS' LETTER from Shirley and Pat

The Ferguson Florissant Branch of AAUW recently celebrated 50 years of service to women and girls in the Ferguson, Florissant, and North County area. For decades, we have met in various churches in Ferguson. The branch board and smaller committees often meet at the Corner Coffee House in Ferguson. Several of our most loyal and active members are long-time residents of Ferguson. Our quest for new members of the branch has resulted in several women who joined over the past couple of years, including African-American women who enhance our diversity. In short, we are firmly committee to Ferguson.

Our projects match the national AAUW priorities and missions. Some have been ongoing, others are new. All have become more important in the aftermath of the shooting of Michael Brown and the continuing needs of the entire community. Once again, we participated in Get Out the Vote, registering new voters and assisting existing voters to update their information with the Board of Election Commissioners in advance of the November 4 election. Our STEM project for the last 2 years has been working with member Toni of PAKT to mentor a girls' Robotics team at Duchesne Elementary School in the Ferguson-Florissant School District. This summer, the same group of our members worked with a summer camp at Duchesne on both robotics and reading tutoring. We are about to begin working with OASIS to add reading tutoring at Duchesne. Any interested member, regardless of whether or not she has worked with robotics, should contact Pat or Toni. Member Mary Ellen has done OASIS tutoring at Vogt School in Ferguson for years and speaks highly of how fulfilling she finds it.

Several members attended the recent PAKT prayer breakfast, which focused on the spiritual needs of the Ferguson community.

We are steadfast in our commitment to help Ferguson and North County heal in the months ahead by working to improve educational opportunities for all young people, especially girls.

PUBLIC POLICY REPORT by Shirley

The elections are over; there is a bit of good news from the general distress. For the first time in history, there are 100 women in Congress, 80 in the House and 20 in the Senate. It is a long way from parity, but it is a start. Remember our motto is "50/50 by 2020."

In other positive election news, there were a number of progressive referenda passed in several

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states, including raising the minimum wage (AK, AR, IL*, NE, SD). In MO two terrible Constitutional amendments were defeated, Amendment 3 (Teacher Evaluation) and Amendment 6 (Early Voting). (*nonbinding. Voters said no to personhood measures in ND and CO. OR passed a state Equal Rights Amendment.

In early reports, a smaller percentage of women voted than usual, especially among young women and minority women.

Several of our progressive Missouri women office holders won: Margo McNeil, Jeanne Kirkton, Mary Nichols, Sue Merideth, Gina Mitton, Genise Monticallo, Michelle Kratky, and Penny Hubbard. Lauren Arthur was elected from District 18. Deb Lavendar won her house seat on the third try. Tracy McCreery was re-elected to the House after an absence of one term. And incumbents Stacey Newman, Rochelle Walton Gray, Karla May, Bonnaye Mims, Sharon Pace, Gail McCann Beatty and Kimberly Gardner were unopposed.

In the Senate, Jill Schupp won her race against a well-funded Republican named John Ashcroft and Maria Chappelle-Nadal won reelection.

Republicans elected 5 new women to the House. In a tentative count of the 2015 Missouri Legislature, there are 24 Republican women and 18 democratic women in the House. There will be 5 women in the Senate, 4 Democrats and 1 Republican. In a strange turn of events, Linda Black (D117) ran as a Democrat and then after the election immediately switched parties.

Nationally, the Democrats lost the Senate. One seat (LA) is still in contention; however, it looks as if the count will be 53 Republican, 46 Democratic. In the House, there are 244 Republicans and 186 Democrats with five races still undecided.

\$TART \$MART and WORK \$MART

\$tart \$mart and Work \$mart are programs that empower college and professional women to negotiate better salaries and benefits. Originally initiated by the Wage Project, these programs were recently purchased by AAUW. AAUW has long participated in them across the country and has had great success.

Started in 2008 with 31 workshops to the current 740 workshops at 336 colleges, community colleges, and universities across the country, educational institutions realize their potential to eliminate the pay gap by equipping women with skills to negotiate for comparable salaries as men's. The program is in all but one state; more than 1000 facilitators have been trained. Locally, UMSL has trained facilitators and presented a number of the workshops on campus.

The Wage Project staff operating these programs have become employees of AAUW in this transfer. Since AAUW was the major promoter of this outstanding project, it is appropriate that these powerful programs are now part of our education and leadership mission.

INTERNATIONAL RELATIONS
