

Children's author Patricia McKissack who has won numerous awards.

While this meeting has traditionally focused on planning programs for the monthly branch meetings, there is much more to the programs, events, and activities we are involved in. All aspects of what we do as AAUW members deserve thoughtful consideration. As a result, a survey of branch members is included with this newsletter.
