

Washington University Professor Dr. Gina Frey will be the featured speaker at the April branch

meeting. Her presentation will center around STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics) Education as it relates to college students. Dr. Frey is executive director of Washington University's Teaching Center and co-director of its university education-research center. One of Dr. Frey's major interests is increasing the number of women in STEM fields. During her college career she was a recipient of one of AAUW's grants to women scholars.

Jessica also spoke about Court Watch, where volunteers monitor court hearings, hoping to encourage fairness and eliminate bias toward women such as those seeking orders of protection for themselves and their children.

PUBLIC POLICY--Strong laws could close gender pay gap once and for all This Letter to the Editor by AAUW's Karen Francis, A. Patricia Shores and Mersine Kallaos appeared in the St. Louis Post Dispatch on March 20, 2017.

Where is the justice when two people in the same area of concentration with equal education, employment experience and enthusiasm for productivity on the job receive unequal compensation due to gender? As unfair as it seems, and though this may sound like a policy from long ago where men earned more than their female counterparts, this scenario is still being played out today in our workforce.

Examine the important and lamentable statistics:

- On average, women who work full time earn about 80 cents for every dollar a full-time worker earns.
- Over a lifetime (47 years), the total estimated loss of earnings of women compared to men are \$700,000 for a high school graduate, \$1.2 million for a college graduate, and \$2 million for a professional school graduate.
- 40 percent of households with children include a mother who is either the sole or primary earner for her family.
- Retirement savings and benefits are significantly less due to salary discrepancy.

As members of the American Association of University Women (AAUW) Missouri Branch, we advocate for strong pay equity legislation, regulation and enforcement to protect employees and assist employers. We also educate the public about this persistent problem and its effect on working families. These efforts are critical elements as we work to close the gender pay gap. Legislation to guarantee and protect pay equity is long overdue.

IMPORTANT DATES FOR VOTING IN AAUW NATIONAL ELECTIONS

Members may vote in the AAUW national elections in advance of the national convention June 14-17 using paper ballots or electronically. Online voting continues during the first two days of the convention. The following dates are crucial:

Voting for national offices:

For voting by paper ballot:

- April 3, 2017-- First day to request paper ballots
- May 4, 2017--Deadline for requesting paper ballots
- May 22--Dedline for mailing paper ballots

For voting online:

- April 14--Voting begins online
- June 15--Online voting ends
