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## APRIL BRANCH MEETING

STEM in St. Louis

The April Branch Meeting featured a panel of three STEM experts, branch member Toni Burrow, Siinya Riley, and Christina Hughes.

Toni Burrow spoke about PAKT, the Robotics teams, the need for Ferguson Florissant School District students to be educated in STEM subjects as well as what another speaker called "soft skills" in order to succeed as they become adults.

Siinya Riley, who has been involved with the STEM program at the St. Louis Science Center for 25 years, presented the latest initiatives of that institution. The program at the Science Center works with area high school students. They work in various STEM areas and also learn the "soft skills" such as interviewing, confident demeanor, teaching other students what they have learned, interning at local businesses and institutions, and more. This program is nationally recognized.

Christina Hughes, Science Coordinator the Hazelwood School District, gave an overview of STEM activities in a major suburban school district. Hazelwood teachers, for instance, are being trained on how to include STEM in elementary science classes. The district is well on the way to having STEM in all levels, K-12. Hazelwood has been an innovator in school STEM programs and is known for its annual STEM Extravaganza.

## **EQUITY ACTION DAY--a summary of an article by Karen Francis**

On Tuesday, April 12, Equal Pay Day 2016, eighty women and some men from the entire state were in Jefferson City, MO to discuss legislation on a few of the many issues facing women and familiesthe gender pay gap, violence against women, voter photo ID and human trafficking and to lobby their legislators. Why these issues?

- April 12, 2016 was Equal Pay Day--the symbolic day for the gender pay gap, where women's salaries match what men earned by December 31, 2015. Specifically, among full time, year round workers, women are typically paid 79% of what men are paid. Altogether, the gender pay gap costs the typical woman at least \$400,000 over the course of her career. That number increases tor college graduates to \$1.2 million!!
- Violence against women--one in 4 women (24.3%) and 1 in 7 men (13.8%) age 18 and older in the US have been victims of severe physical violence by an intimate partner in their lifetime. The cost of lost productivity in the workplace is estimated as \$727.8 million a year. Over 70% of US workplaces have no formal program or policy that addresses workplace violence.
- Voter Photo ID--the pending legislation would implement a law requiring a state issued photo ID and would amend the Missouri Constitution to allow photo ID by carving out an exemption to the constitutions Right to Vote. 225,000 Missouri voters lack a state ID. This disproportionately affects voters of color, young voters, veterans, the working poor, seniors and voters with disabilities.
- Human trafficking--to endorse and recognize prevention and elimination of all forms of human trafficking, to treat trafficked children as victims, and to end the commercial sexual exploitation of

children.

Many women's organizations send representatives, including AAUW, National Council of Jewish Women, League of Women Voters, Missouri Women's Network, and several others. Those attending heard from Rep. Stephen Webber, Rep. Stacey Newman, Rep. Jake Hummel, Rep. Michael Butler, Rep. Sue Meredith, Rep. Lauren Arthur, Rep. Jamilah Nasheed, and representatives of activists for women.

Following the briefings, participants lobbied with over thirty individual representatives and senators or their assistants, sharing information.

## **BYLAWS REVISIONS**

Lillian reports that she has been told by Patt Braley, the state bylaws official, that some changes are needed to our newly revised bylaws. Please make the changes in your copy.

- Article VII, Section 1. Composition. The Board of Directors shall include the elected and appointed officers of the Organization. This Organization must have a minimum of two separate officers, one responsible for management of the Organization and one responsible for the financial affairs. In addition, the Organization shall designate a member other than the contacts for administration and finance to record and make available on request the minutes of each noticed branch or affiliated entity meeting and board meeting.
- Article XVII Amendments to the Bylaws. AAUW-mandated amendments shall be adopted by the Organization's Board of Directors without a vote of the Organization's membership. Provisions of

the Organization's bylaws not mandated by AAUW may be amended by a two-thirds (unless otherwise stipulated by state law) vote of members voting after a quorum is attained. Proposed amendments must be sent to the entire membership at least 14 days prior to the applicable meeting.

#### A DAY IN THE LIFE by Carolyn Herkstroeter

Virginia Jost and I attended A DAY IN THE LIFE, a play inspired by true stories of teen trafficking survivors. Co-sponsored by Creve Coeur Branch AAUW, the Women's International League for Peace and Freedom and Parkway United Church of Christ, an all-girls' theater group from Washington University dramatically told the true stories of young girls caught up in the mesh of trafficking and exploited into prostitution. Their stories are heart-breaking. Recovering their normal lives is daunting, with limited social help. It is very sad and frightening that this happens in our communities--could happen to our daughters and granddaughters. As advocates for women and girls, we need to be aware of ways to advocate for these girls and help them recover their lives.
