PUBLIC POLICY --by Martha Panetti

I hope all of you enjoyed your summer respite. I certainly have relished the slower pace. But of course, as you know, the serious public policy issues facing us have not been resolved. I'm pleased to tell you that Lovene Hartman has agreed to help with the Public Policy portfolio. Lovene and I have talked and will meet soon as she begins her work.

I have written, then rewritten, parts of this article many times as I consider which issues to prioritize: pay equity, voter ID and registration, sexual harassment in the military, expansion of Medicaid under the Affordable Care Act (ACA), public education, to name a few. Each of these deserves a full article. Where can we make a difference?

But the question asked in the last sentence of today's (Sept. 18) lead editorial in the Post-Dispatch caught my attention.

"Why are we sending Missourians' federal tax dollars, and the jobs they promote, across our borders?" the Post asks, after explaining that 26 states, including 5 of the 8 bordering Missouri, have decided to expand Medicaid under provisions of the Affordable Care Act (ACA or "Obamacare") thus receiving billions of federal dollars to provide health insurance for low-income residents and at the same time expanding employment opportunities for residents who work in the health care industry. Missouri, as you know, is not one of the 26.

The Post also points out that ten of the states that are expanding Medicaid have Republican governors. The latest are the states of Michigan and Pennsylvania. Of course, you know public opinion polls still show strong opposition to the ACA. Many of us realize the bill is long and complex and suspect much of the opposition may be due to lack of information. Who has time to read through thousands of pages of a law?

"Be informed and educated about the AFFORDABLE CARE ACT" headlines an article in the League of Women Voters current Metro newsletter. The League refers us to several web sites where we can get understandable information. I checked out the Kaiser Family Foundation web site <kff.org> and found an animated video which breaks down the basic ways the ACA will affect each of us. I encourage each of you to research the facts. Then contact your state legislators and ask why Missouri is refusing to expand Medicaid.

Pay Equity is still an issue! You may have seen that the U.S. Census Bureau has just issued the latest data on the pay gap between men and women in similar jobs. As you might guess, nothing has changed recently. Maxine Lampe, currently President of AAUW Iowa, played an important role in an extensive study of technology employees in Iowa which showed that women's salaries averaging \$59, 548 were significantly less than men's average salaries of \$71, 093, despite the women averaging more experience on the job.

Anastasia Engelbretson has described her experience of lower pay despite having a degree in physics, and learning after the fact that her male colleagues had negotiated their salaries. She emphasizes the importance of negotiating starting pay because "the base salary will affect your retirement."

AAUW will also participate in the National Voter Registration Day September 24. It always amazes me when I meet someone who has never registered to vote. Currently, some states are enacting stringent photo id laws which could prevent untold numbers of people from voting. Stay tuned.
