Every season seems to be busier than the previous one. And that is certainly true of AAUW members and the Ferguson-Florissant Branch. As we move closer to the crucial national election, our voter registration activities become even more important. Our branch will have held six different sessions of voter registration. What a feather in our cap!!

Now, we must do two things: we must encourage everyone we know--friends, relatives, neighbors--to get out and vote; and we must become very familiar with the special Constitutional Amendments and the Proposition (see the special attachment to this newsletter) that will be on the Missouri ballot. These items will affect every Missouri resident for years to come.

MISSOURI LEGISLATURE--2016 BALLOT MEASURES

Included with this newsletter is an attachment describing the 2016 Ballot Measures that have been certified for the November 8, 2016 general election. This information is important to all residents of Missouri.

DIVERSITY COMMITTEE

The Diversity Committee met on September 9. The members discussed the completed Proposed Bylaw Amendment to establish a separate category of membership with no degree requirement. This will be submitted to National for the 2017 Convention.

The committee also discussed what to work on next. Some current writings submit that sexism

and racism are so related that they should be dealt with together. Other topics under consideration are the issue of women's right to vote versus civil rights for African-Americans before, during, and after the Civil War--a conflict of priorities for African-American women. Also being considered are mental health issues and continued efforts to increase diversity in our branch.

The committee will probably meet next after the New Year.

PROPOSED BYLAW AMENDMENT

Branches may submit proposed bylaw amendments to be voted on at the national convention. The process involves writing the amendment and submitting it to National during the fall prior to the convention--in this case, now for the June 2017 convention. Proposed bylaw amendments are reviewed at several levels at National and may be rejected, returned for revisions, or accepted. Our proposal has been submitted.

Amendments to open full membership to people without four year, two year or R.N.s have been submitted and voted down several times. Our proposal calls for a somewhat limited membership for those without degrees, and the hope is that this compromise will be acceptable. The Diversity Committee became involved because the current membership requirement makes educational diversity for AAUW very hard to achieve.

The heart of this proposed amendment is as follows:

Eligibility. Anyone who supports AAUW's mission and pays AAUW dues, but does not possess a degree, shall be eligible for a membership category known as an advocate.

An advocate can participate in all programs and activities of the organization, be recognized as an AAUW member, and speak as a member of the organization.

This category of membership would not be eligible to vote in AAUW national elections nor hold national office. At the branch level and state level, these individuals could not hold offices of president or vice president but could hold other offices as determined by individual bodies and participate fully in the activities of the group.

The process of getting a proposed amend to the convention floor and having members vote on it is a long one, which we have just begun.

EQUALITY DAY BRUNCH

The 29th Annual Women's Equality Day brunch was held on Saturday, August 20 at the Clayton Plaza Hotel. The theme was "Celebrating the Golden Lane," honoring the 100th anniversary of the historic walkless parade of women held in 1916 outside the Democratic National Convention in the Jefferson Hotel in St. Louis.

This year's honorees were introduced by Pat Shores and previous honorees. Jane Crigler was introduced by Laura X, the Honorable Darlene Green by Dianne Modrell, the Honorable Jeanne Kirkton by the Honorable Margo McNeil, and Ann Ross by Judith Parker.

Keynote speaker and author Margo McMillan spoke about *Celebrating the Golden Lane*. She is a feminist working for equality and a conservationist, as well as a lobbyist and educator.

Several branch members attended the brunch.

Graham Cracker Cookies

30 graham cracker sections 2 sticks of butter 1 cup brown sugar 1 cup chopped pecans or walnuts

Line a cookie sheet with sides with parchment paper. Place graham crackers on cookie sheet. Boil sugar and butter until slightly thickened. Add nuts. Spoon over graham crackers. Bake at 350 for 10 min. Cool before removing from pan.
