PUBLIC POLICY

AAUW Public Policy Program Adjustments 2015-2017

AAUW has a well-respected, comprehensive Public Policy Platform. Each biennium, at the national convention, the Platform is updated, sometimes extensively, but usually with very limited additions/subtractions. The major changes from the 2013-2015 Platform which will now appear in the 2015-2017 Platform are as follows:

In the Principles for Action Section

Added sexual assault.

Added "We see an urgent need for meaningful campaign finance reform, open and fair elections, and nonpartisan voter education efforts that will promote equitable political participation and representation in appointed and elected office."

AAUW supports affirmative action to improve racial, ethnic, gender Added "and cultural diversity and inclusion. This included creating a culture of involvement, respect, and connection, where richness of ideas, backgrounds, and perspectives is full appreciated and utilized."

Dropped "AAUW values and is committed to the arts and humanities, which develop and enhance our pluralistic and cultural heritage."

In the Biennial Action and Priorities Section

Added "Vigorous enforcement of Title IX and all other civil rights laws pertaining to education." Moved "Increased access to quality, affordable health care and family planning services,

including expansion of patients' rights."

Added "Passage and ratification of the Equal Rights Amendment."

Some minor verbiage changes were made within other sections of the document. The remainder of the 2013-2015 document was accepted as presented in the last biennium. All proposed changes were approved by the membership for the 2015-2017 document.

WHAT IS DIVERSITY?*

Diversity is a multi-faceted concept, not limited to race or gender. It includes age, education, sexual orientation, national origin, class, job function, life styles, disabilities, cultural background.

As we as an organization move in the direction of more diversity, several factors need to be taken into consideration:

- Involve all the members
- Employ various educational methods: newsletter articles, speakers, field trips
- Use pictures, graphics that reflect diversity because perception is important
- Be creative in promoting and recruiting member diversity
- Network with other groups who have been successful in their diversity efforts

Diversity should be valued. Uniqueness should be celebrated.

The Ferguson-Florissant Branch has a new Diversity Committee which has begun meeting and making plans. The ultimate goal of the committee is to educate the members about diversity, to be an information source for what diversity is and how to approach it, and to increase diversity in the membership and programming.
