LEGISLATIVE FORUM OCTOBER 17

Our branch hosted a lively Legislative forum on October 17 in Ferguson. Five women legislators (Senator Jill Schupp, representatives Kim Gardner, Rochelle Walton Gray, Tracy McCreery, and Margo McNeil) detailed some of the antics (often amusing) and bills that came out of the last session and what to expect for the new session beginning in January 2016. Representative McNeil will again be working on Energy legislation. Senator Schupp will re-introduce a suicide education bill. Representative Walton Gray will again be working on legislation that would limit financial penalties for young people under the age of 21 for traffic offences. Representative McCreery will work with human trafficking and pay loan legislation. Representative Gardner will work with cultural training for health care practitioners and police. Each legislator indicated that she will again sponsor and be involved with a great number of other issues and bills.

Membership VP Gwen Westbrooks reports that 13 branch members and 23 guests attended. Co-President Shirley Breeze is happy to report that a new member joined at the Forum. Welcome!

Several members helped with the set-up and clean-up for this important meeting. Judy Holmes oversaw registration of members and guests, Gwen Westbrooks greeted people as they arrived, and Lovene Hartman secured the use of the Fellowship Hall at the First Presbyterian Church of Ferguson and set up the hospitality table for the meeting. Maya Angelou Bust in Hall of Famous Missourians

Remember our excitement when we installed a bust of Virginia Minor in the Hall of Famous Missourians in the State Capitol (third floor) last year? We now need to put this enthusiasm and commitment toward honoring another famous Missouri woman Maya Angelou.

Maya Angelou is internationally-known as an author whose works include <u>I Know Why the</u> <u>Caged Bird Sings</u> and <u>Mom and Me and Mom</u>. She also wrote outstanding works of poetry including <u>Wouldn't Take Nothing for my Journey Now</u> and <u>Just Give Me a Cool Drink of Water 'fore I Die.</u>

Ms. Angelou was born in St. Louis and spent some of her young life there.

The Speaker of the Missouri House determines who gets a bust in the Hall and the methods used to make this happen. There is a new Speaker so the process has been delayed somewhat. However, his office asks people promoting an individual to send him an e-mail requesting a person be considered with a short statement about the attributes of the person being nominated. These should be sent to Speaker of the House Todd Richardson at todd.richardson@house.mo.gov. The final decision is not expected until spring 2016. However, it helps to solidify the choice of Maya Angelou to have a great response early in the process.

Should Maya Angelou be chosen as one of the nominees, private money would need to be raised (about \$10,000) to hire a sculptor, and provide funds for the pedestal and the installation of the bust. She would be only the ninth woman in the Hall; there are 36 men represented.

PUBLIC POLICY by Karen Francis

Public Policy is at the center of AAUW's mission. November brings attention to the issue of violence against women through the United Nations' Secretary General's UNITE to End Violence Against Women and Girls and its global initiative, Orange the World. Encourage your friends to wear orange between November 25, International Day for the Elimination of Violence and throughout the 16 Days of Activism against Gender-Based Violence leading up to Human Rights Day on December 10. AAUW has participated in the 16 Days Campaign since 2011. When you review AAUW's Public Policy program, you'll notice the freedom from violence and fear of violence is highlighted. On September 10, 2015, AAUW's Vice President of Government Relations, Liza Maatz testified before Congress on "Preventing and Responding to Sexual Assaults on College Campuses."

Why is this so important? The numbers: Sexual assaults disproportionately affect college women and impede their ability for fully participate in campus life. The U.S. Department of Justice found that 1 in 5 women are targets of attempted or completed sexual assault while they were college students, compared to 1 in 16 college men. In 90 percent of the reported cases, the victim knew the attacker. Less than 5 percent of rapes and attempted rapes of college students are reported to campus authorities or law enforcement. A recent study conducted by Gallup for Inside Higher Ed shows that the prevalence of assaults on campuses are not

apparent to college administration. "About one-third (32%) of the respondents agree or strongly agree that sexual assault is prevalent at American colleges and universities. But few presidents (6%) agree or strongly agree that sexual assault is prevalent at their institution." (<u>http://college.usa today.com</u> 2015/03/20. This is why we continue to focus on this and other issues facing women and girls.
