PUBLIC POLICY by Karen Francis

Effort to ensure gender equality continues in Missouri, the U.S.

This article by Karen Francis appeared in the St. Louis Post Dispatch on June 21, 2016

I was honored to be chosen as part of the American Association of University Women (AAUW) delegation to the White House's United State of Women Summit earlier this month. As a member of the AAUW Ballwin Chesterfield Branch [also a dual member of Ferguson Florissant] I have been on the front lines in Missouri, fighting for gender equity issues including equal pay; campus sexual assault; paid leave; science, technology, engineering and math education, and more. It was humbling to be given the opportunity to talk to so many women from other areas of the country that are fighting for the same issues that AAUW members know all too well.

For instance, women in Missouri are paid on average 79 cents of what men are paid. Without an updated federal equal pay law like the Paycheck Fairness Act, it is up to the states to act to close the gender pay gap. St. Louis area AAUW members have worked tirelessly on stronger equal pay laws in Missouri. This summit gave us the opportunity to spotlight successes in our communities while focusing on other ways to support women and families.

I was grateful to represent the AAUW branches in St. Louis, the state of Missouri, and, with others in our community, to share the amazing work that is going on in Missouri. I know I am only one voice, but together with other women and men, our voices will become a movement to make gender equality a reality, not only for people in Missouri but nationwide.

RECREATION OF THE LONG YELLOW LINE--September 3

A Celebrate the Vote Festival will be held September 3, 2016 at the St. Louis Public Library, 1301 Olive street, Saint Louis, MO 63103 from 10 am until 2 pm.

In 1916, over 3000 suffragists converged on St. Louis in the sweltering heat during the Democratic convention poised to re-nominate Woodrow Wilson as President. Their sole demand was a plank in the party platform in support of women's suffrage. Wearing white dresses and golden sashes that said "Votes for Women," they lined the street where the delegates would walk from their hotel to the convention center.

The impact of these women, who formed a "walkless, talkless parade," sometimes called "The Golden Lane" was enormous. They accomplished their objective and got the plank on the platform.

A parade, music, including girl bands, speakers, voter registration, shopping and fun are planned.

DIVERSITY COMMITTEE

NANCY GERBER

Long-time AAUW member Anna Wayne Gerber, known fondly to us as Nancy, died May 3,

2016, after a few years of failing health.

Nancy was a member of a distinguished East Coast family; she was a member of the Daughters of the American Revolution. She earned degrees from Vassar and Middlebury College and received her PhD in Romantic Languages at the University of Pittsburgh. She was a professor of Spanish at UMSL. She was proud of authoring "La Literatura Hispanoamericana En La Critica Espanola."

A stalwart AAUW member, over the years Nancy was Branch President (1989-91, 1995-98, 2002-2003, 2006-2010), newsletter editor, active in various book groups, organizer of First Friday Movies, and much more. (Apologies to those who remember Nancy's other roles that have been overlooked here.)

Nancy was a Named Gift Honoree in 1997, 2010, 2013, and 2016 and a member of the AAUW Legacy Circle.

A memorial service on May 23 at the Lutheran Church of the Living Christ was attended by many of Nancy's friends, including several from Ferguson Florissant AAUW and representatives of other St. Louis area branches.

IMA JEAN MAUPIN OCHSNER

Ima Jean Maupin and her family moved to the Bellefontaine Neighbors area in 1959. Ima taught English at Riverview Junior High at first, and moved to the Senior High School in about 1965, where she was part of the English faculty until she retired in 1979. She joined Ferguson-Florissant AAUW in the late 1970s and maintained her membership until 2014. She married Mel Ochsner in 1984 and moved to Creve Coeur. Since it was too far for her to drive, she did not attend meetings, but paid dues because she supported AAUW's goals. Ima was 100 years old, and would have been 101 in September. She passed away on August 6 after declining in health the last two years.

GENEVIEVE FLORENCE FIELDHAMMER

Long time member Genevieve Fieldhammer died August 8 at age 93. She was a member for decades and enlisted her husband Gene to help with many branch activities. For instance, he served as newsletter editor in the late 80s and 90s. He was a Named Gift Honoree along with the other Booksale Men in 1987. They both were Named Gift Honorees in 1982. She was active in sorting books for the branch book sales. Genevieve was branch Secretary at one time. Sylvia Miller remembers attending a branch party at her beautiful historical home in Ferguson. Husbands were invited, and the women wore fancy clothes while the men wore suits. The Named Gift recipients were announced.

Genevieve was academically accomplished, graduating from the University of Nebraska with a degree in Home Economics and completing her Dietetic Internship at Johns Hopkins University,

In 1944 she enlisted in the U.S. Naval Reserve and was one of the very first WAVES, training at Hunter College in the Bronx, NY and being stationed at Camp Shoemaker in the San Francisco area.

After the war, she returned to graduate work at Kansas State University, where she met Eugene Fieldhammer, whom she married in 1950. They lived in several states in the east and Chicago before settling in Ferguson, where they lived for over fifty years.

Most recently in failing health, Gen and Gene resided at Mother of Good Counsel Home on Natural Bridge.

A memorial service will be held at 2 pm on Saturday, August 27, 2016 at Mother of Good Counsel Home Chapel, 6825 Natural Bridge Road, St. Louis, MO.

Her remains will be taken back to the mountains in her beloved Wyoming, where as a young woman she graduated from Cheyenne High School and worked the rodeos.

MIDWEST REGIONAL CONFERENCE JUNE 3-4, 2016 KANSAS CITY KS

Attendees at the 45th Biennial Regional Conference were treated to a wide variety of exciting activities, speakers, and networking opportunities at the meeting in Kansas City

KS on June 3-4. Keynoting the event was Dr. Catherine Hill, AAUW National Research Vice President. In her remarks she addressed the most recent report, Barriers and Bias: The Status of Women in Leadership. Although statistics are improving for women holding major academic and corporate leadership positions, women still hold a small percentage of the policy-making offices. Katie Simon, National Associate Director of Field Operations, addressed the importance of getting out the vote in this contentious national election year. She also introduced the new materials AAUW has prepared for any activities the branches might take in the next six months. Claudia Richards, AAUW National Senior Branch Relations Manager, joined from the National office and addressed how branches can use new approaches in membership recruitment.

At the Conference Luncheon, Paul Thein, an LAF Plaintiff, discussed his case against the Feather River Community College. The case resulted in major changes for his career and in his family. It is the longest-running case AAUW has supported; he expressed his appreciation to AAUW for the donation of funds for him to pursue it.

On Friday evening, attendees were given an opportunity to view the film The Hunting Ground which addresses the rampant sexual abuse on college campuses.

A wide variety of breakout sessions included public policy issues and information on AAUW activities and procedures. Speakers reviewed the latest in procedures on membership recruitment, fundraising events, and AAUW public policies. Attorneys Denise Lieberman and Peggy Glenn gave insight into Voter Fraud and Achieving Results Through People respectively. Dr. Kelly Sartorius discussed her research on how academic deans of women promoted AAUW from its very beginning. Human Trafficking was addressed by members of the Ballwin-Chesterfield Branch and the St. Charles Coalition Against Human Trafficking in their presentation, which has won financial support through an AAUW Community Action Grant. Dr. Mary Mosley addressed the relationship between racism and sexism and how this is reflected in some recent actions locally and around the country.

The Conference ended with an Open Forum where attendees could have their questions answered concerning current activities and regulations of AAUW and future plans of the organization.
