APRIL BRANCH MEETING

Exploring the Web of Cruelty

Individuals who are cruel to animals are also cruel to people. Information from the Humane Society of Missouri indicates that 70 percent of animal abusers had committed at least one other criminal offense, and almost 40 percent had committed violent crimes against people. One-third of residents with animal abuse complaints also had domestic violence complaints.

These statistics are startling and very disturbing. Sue Gassner, Director of Education at the Humane Society of Missouri, will speak about the link between cruelty to animals, children, and domestic violence on Monday, April 20, at 7:00 pm in the Educational Building of the Immanuel UCC Church, 211 Church Street, Ferguson. PRESIDENTS' LETTER by Pat

Women join AAUW for a variety of reasons, for instance, some for specific activities a branch offers, some for the chance to meet and socialize with others, others for the state and national initiatives supporting women and girls. This organization is structured to meet the needs of women who joined for all kinds of reasons. It also allows women to become involved in ways and at levels they may not have considered at first.

For many members, the local branch is the key to membership. Each branch plans programs that reflect the local issues and interests, as well as incorporating state and national priorities. Local speakers enrich our knowledge of home and often how "home" reflects state and national issues. Certainly, the Ferguson Florissant Branch has responded to the recent events in Ferguson and the realization that our values and priorities call for a response to the issues those events have revealed. We have helped register voters, worked to get free publicity for women-owned business impacted by demonstrations and violence, continued our Robotics/STEM mentoring, added OASIS tutoring, and continued supporting Ferguson businesses by holding meetings in a downtown restaurant.

In addition, the local branch members aren't always serious or issue-based in events we plan and enjoy. Book group, "fun-raisers," garage sales, and luncheons are just some of the ways we gather to enjoy each other's company.

The umbrella of Interbranch Council (IBC) links six local branches. IBC sponsors NCCWSL students to attend the national conference of young women leaders, links the individual branches, and sponsors the annual Spring Fling. All of these are excellent opportunities for women to network.

AAUW MO, our state organization links members from all over the state of Missouri. *Missouri in Motion*, the state newsletter, highlights activities statewide. The annual state meeting allows members from across Missouri to meet face to face and to hear speakers from national.

The national AAUW is a powerhouse of resources for state and local organizations and the engine that drives AAUW public policy in support of women and girls, the research and publishing of data supporting our policy stands, and the face of AAUW (and therefore, many American women and girls) in our nation's capital. Online postings and the quarterly print *Outlook* inform members of AAUW's response to national issues. Scholarships, fellowships, and other academic opportunities are also funded through various programs at the national level.

All members benefit from the multi-layered structure of AAUW. A member may become active at as many levels as she wishes. As an example, a member from a local branch is currently running for a national office. And all members nationwide are eligible to vote in AAUW national elections this spring and attend the national convention in San Diego. From the local branch to Washington, DC, AAUW

represents programs supporting the advancement of women and girls.

The AAUW national elections begin this month. This is your opportunity to make your voice heard on the new officers, changes to the by-laws, and additions/subtractions to the National Public Police Program. Information is available on the AAUW website or in the upcoming *Outlook*.

It is easy to vote! You may choose the method you want, either paper ballot or electronic ballot. You will need your membership number to vote; it is available on the label of your *Outlook*. Paper ballots may be requested through May 8. Electronic voting begins April 15 and ends June 19.

The candidates for office are Patricia Fae Ho, president, Alicia Hetman, vice president; candidates for board of directors are Sue Barley, Maria Ellis, Malinda Gaul, Sally Goodson, Eileen Hartmen, Rebecca Norlander, Judith Pfeil, Glenda Price, Ellie Hill, Traci Jensen, Melissa Johnsen, Martha Reeder, Pam Thiel, Dot McLane, and Eileen Menton. You may vote for up to 10 directors.
