APRIL BRANCH MEETING by Gwen W.

Approximately fifteen members of the Ferguson Florissant branch of AAUW and two guests were treated to an informative presentation on the connection between domestic violence and animal violence on Monday, April 20th at Immanuel UCC Church in Ferguson. The speaker for the evening was Suzanne Gassner from the Humane Society of Missouri.

Ms. Gassner gave background on the Humane Society, which receives no funding from state or national sources and is completely dependent on donations. She explained the distinction between animal neglect and the more serious animal abuse, although there is much gray area between the two. Ms. Gassner also reported that animal neglect and cruelty cross all social-economic lines. An affluent family is just as likely to mistreat animals as a poorer family in a less affluent area. Perhaps the most shocking statistic regarding animal abuse is that in 88% of child abuse cases, it is reported that there has also been animal abuse in the home. This strong correlation reveals the serious nature of animal cruelty. It clearly DOES lead to cruelty to humans as well. That is a powerful message that the Humane Society of Missouri attempts to publicize.

Like the end of the calendar year in December, the end of the branch year is a time for reflection. This year in particular seems to require a thoughtful summary. We all know by heart the events that came to be called "Ferguson" worldwide; there is no need to recount them here. We have also seen similar events and reactions to them spread around the country. Sadly, we are not alone.

Here in St. Louis, several groups and individuals have responded to "Ferguson" in ways they

believe will eventually improve the situation for all citizens. Churches, community groups, universities, and individuals have all responded. So have college students who came to help register voters--perhaps not realizing that voter registration was one of the first responses by local groups including AAUW.

The Ferguson Florissant Branch has worked tirelessly to support and help improve Ferguson. Nothing we have done is particularly flashy or worthy of media recognition. It has been thoughtful action in a number of ways that we can contribute to the betterment of our community. Those ways all support AAUW's stated goals of advancing the well-being of women and girls. Since women and girls rarely exist in a vacuum, they also support men and boys in the areas of education, civic rights like voting, and, in this instance, financial recovery.

So what have the members of Ferguson Florissant AAUW done? We worked to register voters at more than one site. Carolyn and others continue to contact women-owned businesses to offer free listings that Jan Scott has made available in her online **Women's Yellow Pages.** In the Ferguson Florissant School District, we continue to mentor Robotics students and more of us are now doing reading tutoring in the OASIS program. We continue to meet in Ferguson, as we always have. Board meetings often are held at the Corner Coffee House. Branch meetings are frequently held at Immanuel UCC across the street from Ferguson City Hall. We plan to return to the Farmers Market this summer and fall and to participate in the city-wide yard sale in May.

Not everything we have done this year is directly tied to "Ferguson." Many of our traditional programs and events have also gone forward. These included the opening reception in September, the Christmas party featuring Anna and Elsa of *Frozen*, Game Day, attending Spring Fling, the meet and greet in April, soon the May Luncheon. Always, we have programs presented at branch meetings that address important topics. The annual Equal Pay Rally in Jefferson City is essential. Several members will attend the AAUW state meeting in Columbia May 2.

Because of events beyond our control, this has been an exceptional year for our branch. We have risen to the challenges by finding ways we can do our part in helping to create an even better Ferguson for all its citizens. We have also continued to enjoy several of our regular activities. We have done well this year.

I love movies, don't you? Movies provide a respite from the barrage of bad news and seemingly insurmountable issues we all face, both personally and locally. Does anyone really have a do-able plan for fixing Missouri's education system? Will we see mass transit in our lifetime in STL county? Can we trust Iran? And, finally, what's to do about income inequality? I'm feeling a bit overwhelmed, so I turned to a movie last weekend. It had a provocative title, "While We're Young." I wanted to see what mistakes Hollywood thought we Boomers had made. Earlier this spring I had seen "The Best Exotic Marigold Hotel" (another movie about aging) and loved it. It seemed to be about me, only me living in India. The characters had moxie, pretty good health, were ex-pats looking for excitement and adventure in their "new normal." There were even hints at sexual encounters. I liked "Marigolds." "While We're Young," however, did not address any issues connected with my definition of "old" which in that film was fixed no older than forty-five. Are you kidding? Happily, the leads agreed at the end of the film that a few important experiences lay ahead of them despite their being "old" and in their forties.

Both movies made me think about what it means to be "old" in our culture at this time in our lives. Unlike other issues, "aging" does not have a fixed public policy to which we can all refer for comfort, much less for guidance. I have always taken comfort in the old adage, "Grow old along with me. The best is yet to be" but lately I've also tried to expand my understanding of what it means to be "old" by Googling terms and topics related to "aging in place," a phrase I've only recently started to see with some frequency. Some of these sites speak eloquently of the homelessness of older women and the lack of adequate resources to ensure safety and care for all women. These websites deal, not with Hollywood and its depiction of well-coifed silver heads and status symbols, but with reality as most of us know it: loss, income limitations, hard choices and friends to help us make a difference. You might want to check out: Women Living in Community and Communities for Baby Boomers. I learned about Barney Frank's mother, Elise Frank, who at 70 became an activist on behalf of older women. Very interesting and inspiring reading. Still--I love movies, don't you?

EQUAL RIGHTS ACTION DAY April 14, 2015 Pay Equity Day

An enthusiastic group of women gathered at the capitol in Jefferson City on April 14, 2015, to commemorate Pay Equity Day. The day began with a Legislative Briefing dealing with bills that were being heard in either the House or the Senate or in committees. Several legislators brought messages about legislation they were working on; these included Reps. Bill Otto, Margo McNeil, Stacey Newman and Judy Morgan. Several other individuals representing various issues also made presentations, including Mark Jones for NEA, Angie Postal for Planned Parenthood, D.K. Hirner for Empower Missouri (MASW), who spoke on the welfare bill which would cut some benefits and affect recipients in other negative ways.

At noon the March for Women's Rights convened. Women with signs supporting women's issues marched into the capitol building, after which the Pay Equity Rally began. Reps. Deb Lavender, Mary Nichols, Margo McNeil and Senator Paul LeVota spoke of legislation they were sponsoring and the general mood of legislators as the session nears its end. Organizations making presentations at the Rally included AAUW, Coalition of Labor Union Women, League of Women Voters, Missouri Women's Network, NARAL.

During the day, attendees visited with their legislators, carrying messages of support for pay equity and other legislation that would benefit women.

The AAUW national elections begin this month. This is your opportunity to make your voice heard on the new officers, changes to the by-laws, and additions/subtractions to the National Public Police Program. Information is available on the AAUW website or in the upcoming *Outlook*.

It is easy to vote! You may choose the method you want, either paper ballot or electronic ballot. You will need your membership number to vote; it is available on the label of your *Outlook*. Paper ballots may be requested through May 8. Electronic voting begins April 15 and ends June 19.

The candidates for office are Patricia Fae Ho, president, Alicia Hetman, vice president; candidates for board of directors are Sue Barley, Maria Ellis, Malinda Gaul, Sally Goodson, Eileen Hartmen, Rebecca Norlander, Judith Pfeil, Glenda Price, Ellie Hill, Traci Jensen, Melissa Johnsen, Martha Reeder, Pam Thiel, Dot McLane, and Eileen Menton. You may vote for up to 10 directors.
