NATIONAL BYLAWS PROPOSALS

This spring, AAUW members across the country had the opportunity to vote on three proposed amendments to the bylaws. The amendment to have the terms of national board members staggered passed. The amendment to include non-members on the national board and the amendment to allow persons without degrees to be members of the organization both failed.

Ferguson Florissant Branch members can be proud that 60% of our members voted on these

proposals, the highest percentage of voters in Missouri.

PUBLIC POLICY by Shirley Breeze

Women and Social Security

Social Security is vital to million of American women, young and old. Over half of older women would fall into poverty were it not for SS. It helps young mothers and their children when their breadwinners are disabled or die.

Women make up 65 percent of all SS beneficiaries age 62 and older, and 66 percent of all beneficiaries age 85 and older. Women age 65 and older are more likely than men of the same age to be widowed. Of female SS beneficiaries age 62 and over, only 51 percent receive benefits based solely on their own work record.

It is important for women to receive all they are entitled to under SS. Women tend to take time out of the work force to care for children or aging parents. They have earned less than men and experience the pay gap when they are working. Therefore, even if they have retirement plans where they work, SS often fills the gap between what they receive from working less.

There are currently several challenges to SS. One of the most prominent is privatization. Privatization has not been proven to be the most effective way to keep entities vibrant and healthy. Another challenge to SS is the legislative push to scale down operations by limiting funding for the agency. A further challenge is the constant negative allegations that the agency will not have enough money to pay out benefits when they come due. Several reforms have been promoted to alleviate some of these perceived problems with SS. One is to raise the payroll tax cap, which will increase the income, thus lowering any cash shortfall. Another reform is a caregiver credit, which would give SS credits to people who step away from paid work to care for family members.

These and other criticisms are sometimes used to devalue SS's value to society==and especially women. Women need SS support now more than ever.

AAUW MISSOURI STATE BOARD MEETING

The State Board met on July 14. Topics included

- Public Policy goals for 2018-2019--Get Out The Vote, protection and enforcement of Title IX, and closing the pay gap.
- Dues--Shape the Future dues (\$49.50) and the elimination or reduced dues from March to June.
- The new Mission Statement--The mission of the American Association of University Women (AAUW) is to advance gender equity for women and girls through research, advocacy, and education.

• Career Development Grant--The Ferguson Florissant/Shirley Breeze Fellowship is partially funding Carolyn Moore, who is pursuing an MS in management and leadership at Western Governors University in Salt Lake City. She is fire captain in the St. Louis Fire Department.

- Grant Monies--This year AAUW will distribute \$3.9 million in grants.
- Research--There has not been an announcement of the topic of the next research report.

- National and State Board Positions of Branch Members--Karen Francis chairs the National Public Policy Committee. Mable Davis, Pat Kelemen, and Shirley Breeze serve on the MO State Board.
- National Meetings--there is a very tentative plan for the 2020 meeting to be several, held in different parts of the United States.
- Bylaws--Another tentative plan is to have bylaw voting pretty much every year.
