MARTIN LUTHER KING CELEBRATION—by Carolyn Herkstroeter

Martin Luther King spoke at Iowa State University when I was a student there. A dynamic speaker I was struck by every word. Word that reached beyond the complacency of rural Iowa; words that told us we needed to reach beyond what we knew, broaden our boundaries and step up and make a difference. We needed to go into the cities and make changes so that all people could have equal opportunities and chances. As much as I was moved by Dr. King's speech, I denied that I would ever live in a city.

Then I graduated, came to St. Louis, met people different from my rural lowa life, and saw boundaries that I had never thought about. I remembered Dr. King's words and understood what he meant. As riots broke out across the South and Iowa State students joined the crusade for equality, I realized the impact of Dr. King's speeches and saw his words in action, words that impacted our nation.

Years later I visited the hotel in Memphis where Dr. King died. I stood in the building across the street where the assassin fired the bullet that killed Dr King. There is a deep sadness there and appreciation for a man who put in motion a mighty crusade for equality and opportunity for all people.

Normandy School District will be honored with Dr. Rance Thomas Excellence in Community Partnership Award. There will be a reception preceding the program from 5:00-6:00 pm. Guests are asked to make donations to Archers' Market, a campus food pantry for STLCC students.

I hope our branch members will attend this event in honor of Dr. King.
