AAUW's <u>National Conference for College Women Student Leaders</u> (NCCWSL) is where hundreds of young women come to turn a moment into a movement. Each year, we bring together hundreds of college women from around the country for three days of leadership training, inspiration and networking. Enter the conference as a passionate leader and leave it with the skills and confidence to pursue your goals.


NCCWSL has grown rapidly since its founding more than three decades ago, attracting over 10,000 student leaders. In 2019 the conference brought together 800 attendees representing 48 states and over 300 colleges and universities. The diversity of backgrounds and ideas at NCCWSL is part of what makes it such a transformative experience. The workshops, panels, speakers and activities provide endless opportunities to learn from experts, while peer networking allows you to learn from one another and make lifelong connections.



IBC, Branches and Missouri AAUW

You will have seen the term "IBC" in the NCCWSL funding paragraph and in other AAUW conversations. IBC stands for InterBranch Council. In St. Louis, IBC or InterBranch is officially known as the

AAUW Metro St. Louis Interbranch Council.

IBC's purpose is to connect the five branches within the metropolitan St. Louis area through cooperation, communication, and financial support of programs and projects. Our five branches are St. Louis city (generally downtown and University City members), Ferguson-Florissant, Kirkwood-Webster Groves, Ballwin-Chesterfield and St. Charles. All branch members may attend IBC meetings but there are restrictions on voting. InterBranch helps build College and University Partnerships (CU) in the St. Louis area to help college women learn about AAUW's NCCWSL, grants, fellowships and scholarships.

InterBranch Council plans the annual Spring Luncheon each March known as Spring Fling where the Barbara Lackritz Award is presented to honorees. The Barbara Lackritz AAUW Service Award recognizes AAUW branch members in the St. Louis area who have contributed many years of selfless, dedicated service to promote the AAUW mission. Barbara Lackritz, or Barb to those who knew her, was a key St. Louis AAUW member. Originally from New York, Barb's many accomplishments included a Master's Degree from Columbia University, speech pathologist at a St. Peters elementary school, very successful fundraiser, women's rights advocate, internet leader for AAUW Branches and Missouri, alderman for Town and Country along with serving on the city's planning commission, and office holder at all levels of AAUW, including National. Barb authored a book on Leukemia and was a national speaker to doctors and pharmaceutical firms on the illness. Barb passed away from leukemia in 2003. Our own Carolyn Herkstroeter received the Barbara Lackritz Award at IBC's Spring Luncheon this year (more information to follow). InterBranch Council has its own book club, ¡Adelante! which translates to ahead, in front, or forward. ¡Adelante! meets the 4th Thursday afternoon by Zoom most months of the year. AAUW Missouri publishes its newsletter *Missouri in Motion* which is made available on its website. This newsletter is an excellent resource for ongoing work and what is happening in Branches across the state.



We champion equal opportunities in education. Though more than 60% of college graduates are women, they face barriers and biases throughout their schooling. From pre-school to graduate school, girls and women are unconsciously steered into certain fields of studies and away more lucrative ones, such as in STEM.



Our members, supporters and staff work on local, state and federal levels to support laws and policies that enable women's success. Our work in statehouses





and the U.S. Capitol has helped pass hundreds of pieces of legislation. Our Legal Advocacy team has supported plaintiffs in more than 125 gender equity legal cases.



Women's Wealth

And it's not just annual earnings: The pay gap also contributes to the wealth gap. It makes it difficult for women to amass savings, build wealth and achieve economic security. Overall, the average American woman has a net worth of \$5,541, less than half of the \$12,188 average net worth of a man. In terms of overall wealth, a single woman has only 32 cents for each dollar a single man has. And the wealth gap is even wider for women of color, who have just pennies for every dollar a white male has.



Women have only 70% of the overall retirement income that men have.

Saving Less

The pay gap follows women into retirement: As a result of lower lifetime earnings, they receive less in Social Security and pensions. Women collect only 80% of what men collect in Social Security benefits, and just 76% in pensions. In terms of overall retirement income, women have only 70% of what men do. White men over 65 have an average annual income of \$44,200, while white women over 65 must get by on \$23,100, Black women on \$21,900, and Latinas on \$14,800.

Deeper in Debt

The consequences of this gap affect women throughout their lives. While women outpace men in earning bachelor's, master's and advanced degrees, they take on greater debt to pay for their education: Women hold nearly two-thirds of the outstanding student debt in the United States — almost \$929 billion as of early-2019. Because of the gender pay gap, women have a harder time repaying loans, meaning women's debt burden compounds as time goes on.





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AAUW MO - Votes for Women Trail Project Off to a Strong Start

This year, AAUW Missouri adopted a statewide project to add more sites and individuals to the Missouri Trail portion of the National Collaborative for Women's History Sites (NCWHS) website. Since Fall 2021, 13 branches were trained to add sites and individuals. Several branches are searching for women's suffrage activity that took place in their area before August 26, 1920, by sharing the project with college professors, historians, and archivists; inviting the participation of other organizations in the search; and researching the local places and individuals who contributed to women getting the vote.

Since the Votes for Women Trail is a multi-year project, we hope that more branches will take on this project. Each addition to the Trail honors a Missouri place or person that made an important contribution to women finally having a vote.

Trail Marker Installations Across Missouri

Cynthia Holmes, NCWHS Missouri representative, has announced that the first installation of a marker, supported from an earlier program, will be on **Sunday**, **July 3**, **2022**, **at the Schlafly Tap Room**, 2100 Locust in St. Louis to celebrate "The Golden Lane."

The Schlafly building was there in 1912 when thousands of women lined the street in suffrage colors to demand that the Democratic Party enact a platform supporting the right of women to vote.

We hope every AAUW member in driving distance of St. Louis will attend in suffragist finest to mark this important step in fighting for the vote. We look forward to more commemorative adventures. Stay tuned for information about other celebrations around the state.

The leak of a draft opinion in the *Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Organization* case suggests that the Supreme Court may overturn the landmark *Roe v. Wade* decision and take away a fundamental right that Americans have held for almost 50 years. AAUW supports choice in determining one's reproductive life and increased access to health care and family planning services.

What Comes Next

AAUW's Public Policy team is working closely with coalition partners to direct our members on the best next steps. In the meantime, here's what you can do to fight for reproductive freedom.

Pass the Women's Health Protection Act (WHPA). This critical bill would take the principles of *Roe v. Wade* and make them federal law. As the public outcry grows opposing the overturning of *Roe v. Wade*, this offers an opportunity to protect the right to abortion. Tell your Senators to support abortion access for people everywhere in the United States!

Learn Where We Stand. The protection of reproductive rights—including access to contraceptive care, abortion, sexual health education and family planning services—has been an unwavering AAUW policy principle since 1977. Access to abortion is not only a fundamental right, it is critical to a woman's ability to control her life, her body and her future. Expanding reproductive services increases women's prospects of attaining economic security. Moreover, attacks on reproductive rights are especially harmful in a country that lacks policies to make parenthood and pregnancy safer, including accessible maternal health care, paid leave, child care and workplace protections for pregnant workers.
