AAUW GREATEST NEEDS FUND – Statistics include the fact that only 4% of AAUW's assets are unrestricted while 96% is restricted, with fellowships, grants and the Legal Advocacy Fund being fully endowed. AAUW dues cover only 13% of AAUW's budget, which also limits the amount of research that can be done. Research has been critical in keeping the AAUW name in the forefront as a leader in advancing equity for women and girls.

One of the many effects of less Greatest Needs funds has been staff reduction to maintain a balanced budget. Staff now numbers 45, down from a high of 110 staff and interns six years ago.

All donations to the Greatest Needs Fund until December 31 will be matched by the AAUW.

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DEI / Public Policy

Hello AAUW Branch Members,

I am sure all of you have heard of the Two Minute Activist that is on our website. I would like to share a hot topic with you that will share more information that should be known about the attempt to end the student debt crisis and how it can support women in higher education.

On August 24, 2022 the Biden-Harris Administration announced a plan to cancel up to \$10,000 of federal student loan debt for borrowers making under 125,000 annually (up to \$20,000 for Pell Grant recipients). AAUW applauds this announcement and urges all eligible borrowers to follow the application process.

AAUW is asking us to support Congress in an effort to achieve the "big picture" goals for this crisis to be addressed. AAUW's report *Deeper in Deb: Women and Student Loans* found that women bear the blunt of student debt, and because of the gender pay gap, women have less income with which to repay their loans after graduation. Due to inequality in pay, it takes women much more time than men to pay off their initial debt and the accumulating interest.

In order to see a true effect of decreasing student loan debt, here are some items to consider:

- Protect and expand Pell Grants for lower-income students to reduce the amount of student loan debt they have to take on to complete a degree.
- Help eliminate the gender pay gap, such as the Paycheck Fairness Act
- Increase funding for public colleges and universities and support efforts to move toward tuition-and debt-free options for students.
- Make it much easier for students to enroll in income driven repayment options and public service loan forgiveness programs.
- Protect student loan borrowers from abusive and fraudulent practices by schools, lenders, and loan servicers.
- Address both the academic and overall financial needs of students, such as affordable access to childcare.

As I wrote this article, I was also thinking how this crisis will have an effect on your thoughts towards having a college degree to become a member of AAUW.

Hope you enjoyed the article and you will be able join us for one of branch (Ferguson-Florissant) DEI meetings.

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November 28, 1881 Celebrating 141 Years!

AAUW's story begins in 1881, when a small group of female college graduates banded together to open the doors for women's career advancement and to encourage more women to pursue higher education.

Our History

The history of the American Association of University Women mirrors the progress of women in the United States. As the number of women graduating from college grew, so did our membership.

We've published hundreds of research reports, from an 1885 paper disproving a prevailing myth that college impairs a woman's fertility to, most recently, a study documenting the economic impact of workplace sexual harassment. We have supported the academic achievements of many thousands of scholars, from scientist Marie Curie, the first woman to win a Nobel Prize, to astronaut Judith Resnik, the second woman in travel in space.

Our advocacy efforts have propelled countless new laws, including the Equal Pay Act, first proposed in 1945 and finally passed in 1963; the Title IX amendment in 1972; the Family and Medical Leave Act in 1993; the Lilly Ledbetter Fair Pay Act in 2009; and the Paycheck Fairness Act, which was passed by the U.S. Representatives in 2019 but is awaiting action in the Senate.

We've come a long way, but we still have a long way to go.

In many ways, the fight for gender equity is just getting started. Join us!

1880 to 1910

The Roots of a Trailblazing Mission

AAUW was founded by Marion Talbot, who became the Dean of the College of Women at the University of Chicago and a leading figure in higher education, and Ellen Swallow Richards, the first woman to earn a degree in chemistry and a leader in the field of home economics.

1920s to 1950s

AAUW's Formative Decades

Throughout the economic boom of the 1920s, the Great Depression and the New Deal of the 1930s, WW II and the post-war era of the '40s and '50s, AAUW continued to thrive. Our influential network helped to increase the number of women attending college and universities and supported women in their career development.

1960s to 1980s

The Civil Rights and Feminist Era

The 1960s ushered in an era of significant social progress in the U.S., and AAUW played a pivotal role. Throughout the decade, we became increasingly engaged in the Civil Rights Movement: AAUW President Blanche Dow was on the Steering Committee of the National Women's Committee for Civil Rights.

1990s to the Present

The New Millennium & Into the Future

AAUW has continued to trailblaze for women, breaking down barriers and making the world more equitable for future generations. We are a prominent voice in the national conversation about the gender pay gap, anchored in the annual publication of The Simple Truth about the Gender Pay Gap.


